TCLEOSE Credit: Law enforcement personnel attending this course are eligible for two hundred forty (240) hours of Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education (TCLEOSE) credit.

Graduate Credit: Graduates will be eligible to apply for up to nine (9) graduate credits and a graduate Certificate in Law Enforcement Management from the University of North Texas (UNT). This highly-innovative undertaking will combine on-site course work in the Management College with distance learning and independent study through UNT. It should be noted that while the details of this joint arrangement are still being developed, it is expected that participants in ILEA programs will be able to take advantage of this important benefit before the end of calendar year 2005.
